LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT



For 67 years, MacDonald Training Center has embraced challenges as new opportunities to build toward a greater future.

When in-person services were suspended in March, due to the global pandemic, virtual instruction began days later. Knowing that the individuals we serve are often neglected or forgotten in a crisis, MTC jumped into action providing laptops for students in our certificate programs so that they could progress towards certifications online. Additional bandwidth supported telehealth and entertainment access for medically frail seniors suddenly sheltering at home with 24- hour- a- day care from our loving Residential team. Many clients reduced social isolation by participating with their peers in online classes through Google classroom or MTC's YouTube channel. MTC launched an innovative eMpowered Virtual Learning program which is a model for successfully bring a meaningful day to clients with medical conditions who continue to remain at home.

MTC's Employment team had limited from face- to- face contact and often had to tell clients that they had been furloughed or fired. The employment team maintained connections by phone, text or email with clients and employers to ensure that relationships are maintained and that people with disabilities may be considered for any available positions now and when the crisis is curtained. The team expanded in person and virtual workplace readiness, career exploration and technology camps for youth with disabilities needing extra support during the crisis.

Since March, we have purchased thousands of dollars of personal protective equipment (PPE), cleaning supplies, and retrofitted existing spaces to allow for social distancing in classrooms. At the same time, we lost reimbursements for services, reductions in revenue from our business partners and loss of fundraising events. Our financial and development teams sought and found Federal and local support to keep us going, saving jobs allowing the continuation of vitally needed services.

In August, we opened a new location in Sabal Park. With extensive Covid protocols in place, we happily welcomed back a small cohort of clients. Even masks cannot hide the joy we have at seeing friends and meeting new ones! Thank you to our staff for always rising to the challenges of this unique year.

Shared values and purpose are helping us navigate this unprecedented time. This year as always the people we serve are at the center of every decision, we make. They are the reason MTC exists.

We have been comforted, encouraged, and humbled by the generosity of our community. Remarkable individuals, organizations, community groups, businesses, and corporations stepped up to support our mission. We will not forget this generosity.

As we look ahead with courage, tenacity, and as always, resilience, we invite you to unite with us to meet today's challenges while steadfastly moving towards a more inclusive future.

OUR YEAR IN REVIEW

When on-site programs were suspended in March 2020 due to the Coronavirus pandemic, MTC staff quickly adapted to deliver education and employment placement programs on virtual platforms such as Google Classroom, Zoom and Youtube to help clients maintain progress toward program goals.

MTC increased staffing and support levels to meet the dramatically increased needs of our Community Living residential clients, many medically frail seniors, sheltering in place during the quarantine. With emergency Coronavirus response funding MTC provided internet service, laptops and large-screen TVs so that clients could connect virtually with family members and partake in virtual programming designed to maintain social interactions that reduce isolation and continue life-skills training required for independent living.

MTC's business enterprises were deemed essential and uninterrupted throughout the pandemic. Services to local and national businesses, as well as packaging and shipping the SunPass transponder for the Florida Turnpike Authority continued.

After careful preparation and implementation of Covid-19 safety measures required by the Agency for Persons with Disabilities, the CDC and OSHA, MTC welcomed back a small cohort of students on August 31, 2020 for in-person programming in the phased reopening of our Tampa and new Brandon location in Sabal Park. Many of the extensive facility renovations, protective supplies and sanitation measures taken were make possible by grant funding from Hillsborough County. Today both locations are fully operational.
